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Gateway Arch Park Foundation Receives Capacity-Building Grant from National Park Foundation for Gateway Arch National Park

Grant funds outdoor art display commissioned with St. Louis ArtWorks during Old Courthouse renovation

ST. LOUIS (April 14, 2023) Gateway Arch Park Foundation was one of 41 park partner organizations to receive a Strong Parks, Strong Communities grant from the National Park Foundation, the official nonprofit partner to the National Park Service. The grant enables Gateway Arch Park Foundation ("the Foundation") to commission a temporary mural installation that will be displayed on each side of the construction fencing around the Old Courthouse.

The Old Courthouse, part of Gateway Arch National Park, is currently undergoing a \$27.5 million renovation and is closed to the public. The murals will incorporate the civil rights themes of the Old Courthouse, as the site of the *Dred Scott* case and hundreds of other freedom suits, as well as the other new exhibits planned for the building.

The Foundation has commissioned St. Louis ArtWorks for this innovative project. St. Louis ArtWorks will hire a maximum of 15 youth apprentices (age 14-19) and two teaching artists for each season (spring and summer) to work exclusively on this project. Commissioned works of art help St. Louis ArtWorks better achieve its mission of bringing high-quality arts education and workforce development training to youth throughout the St. Louis region.

"We are thrilled to receive this support from our partners at the National Park Foundation to expand our local reach and partner with other cultural nonprofits here in St. Louis," said Ryan McClure, executive director of Gateway Arch Park Foundation. "This funding helps keep the next generation at the forefront of our work and offers more access and opportunity to communities that have historically not felt welcome in national and urban parks."

"One of the many special things about Gateway Arch National Park is the events that happened here that made such an impact on American history and even human rights globally," said Pam Sanfilippo, program manager for Museum Services & Interpretation at Gateway Arch National Park. "This funding

helps us engage youth in learning through creating and finding relevance to these important civil rights stories of our nation's past."

"We are honored to have our youth selected for this project," said Jacqueline K. Dace, executive director for St. Louis ArtWorks. "It provides them a great opportunity to showcase their skills and design public art in a highly visible area. This project further highlights to everyone how art and history can naturally coalesce."

In February, Sanfilippo gave a presentation to the ArtWorks apprentices about the Old Courthouse construction project and the park themes that will be addressed in the new exhibits to help inform the artistic design. The first two art pieces are scheduled to be installed in May and the second two in August.

The Strong Parks, Strong Communities grants help address nonprofit park partner needs most urgent to the parks they serve. The grants enable partner organizations to invest in strategic planning, community engagement, improving visitor experience in parks, increasing organizational relevancy and resiliency, and launching new fundraising campaigns.
